A dog makes considerable demands on your time and resources. A dog owner needs to spend time walking, grooming, training, and playing with their pet every day. Certain breeds may require professional grooming. Dogs require special food and regular veterinary care. This includes annual shots and monthly preventative medications for heartworm, fleas, and ticks. In some cases, these expenses can exceed \$1,000 a year. Do you feel that you are capable of providing these things for the remainder of the dog's life at this time?
